Means of assessment and feedback to students:	As part of the workshop, participants will use the rural sanitation guidance to plan and cost a sanitation intervention for a given context. They will then present their plans to the group for feedback. This will give participants the opportunity to develop new skills by using the new guidance and gain feedback on their performance while doing so.
Mechanism and means of course evaluation:	A short survey on course expectations will be done at the beginning of the workshop and another done at the end to gather participants' feedback on whether their expectations were met.
