Aims:	The purpose of this course is to promote an approach to WASH programmes to ensure that they are inclusive of all users. This will be substantiated by specific training on considerations of gender equality and safety; inclusion of disabled and older people; inclusion and understanding of the requirements of transgender people.
Intended audience:	It is aimed at WASH practitioners who are involved in WASH programming. No previous experience of making WASH inclusive is assumed, but if people do already have some experience (or have attended previous workshops on equity and inclusion) they will still find the specific focus areas relevant.

Format and Content of Workshop	<ul> <li>Session 1: 9.00- 9.30 – Introduction to inclusive approach to WASH:</li> <li>Participatory group discussions on participants' experience of exclusion in WASH</li> <li>Short presentation on social model and barrier analysis as analytical tool</li> <li>Session 2: 9.30 to 10.00 – split into</li> <li>3 Groups: Each group to conduct session with mixed format of discussion and presentation to understand specific concepts and principles relating to the issue: (Gender and WASH, Disability, Transgender and WASH)</li> <li>10:00 – 10:30 – Coffee break</li> <li>Session 3: 10:30 – 11.45</li> <li>3 groups: Each Group to carry out practical exercised or group work to explore specific aspects, (e.g. accessibility and safety audits; features of female friendly toilets; principles of transgender inclusion).</li> <li>11.45-12.00 – Each group shares back top three learnings with the other groups.</li> </ul>
